Non Discrimination ADA/Title VI Complaint Procedures

These procedures provide guidance for all complaints filed under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) as they relate to any program or activity that is administered by Illinois Center for Autism including consultants, contractors and vendors. Intimidation or retaliation as a result of a complaint is prohibited by law. In addition to these procedures, complainants reserve the right to file a formal complaint with other State or Federal agencies or to seek private counsel for complaints alleging discrimination. Every effort will be made to resolve complaints at the lowest possible level.

- (1) Any person who believes he and/or she has been discriminated against on the basis of race, color, national origin, or disability may file a Discrimination complaint by completing and submitting the agency's Title VI Complaint Form.
- (2) Formal complaints must be filed within 180 calendar days of the last date of the alleged act of discrimination or the date when the alleged discrimination became known to the complainant(s), or where there has been a continuing course of conduct, the date on which the conduct was discontinued or the latest instance of the conduct.
- (3) Complaints must be in writing and signed by the complainant(s) and must include the complainant(s) name, address and phone number. The ADA/Title VI contact person will assist the complainant with documenting the issues if necessary.
- (4) Allegations received by fax or e-mail will be acknowledged and processed, once the identity of the complainant(s) and the intent to proceed with the complaint have been established. For this, the complainant is required to mail a signed, original copy of the fax or email transmittal for the complaint to be processed.
- (5) Allegations received by telephone will be reduced to writing and provided to the complainant for confirmation or revision before processing. A complaint form will be forwarded to the complainant for him/her to complete, sign and return for processing.
- (6) Once submitted Illinois Center for Autism will review the complaint form to determine jurisdiction. All complaints will receive an acknowledgement letter informing her/him whether the complaint will be investigated by the Illinois Center for Autism or submitted to the State or Federal authority for guidance.
- (7) Illinois Center for Autism will notify the IDOT Civil Rights Office of ALL Discrimination complaints within 72 hours via telephone at (217) 782-2762; or email at DOT.Complaint@illinois.gov.
- (8) Illinois Center for Autism has 30 business days to investigate the complaint. If more information is needed to resolve the case, the Authority may contact the complainant. The complainant has 30 business days from the date of the letter to send requested information to the investigator assigned to the case. If the investigator is not contacted by the complainant or does not receive the additional information within 30 business days, the Authority can administratively close the case. A case can be administratively closed also if the complainant no longer wishes to pursue their case.
- (9) After the investigator reviews the complaint, she/he will issue one of two letters to the complainant: a closure letter or a letter of finding (LOF). A closure letter summarizes the allegations and states that there was not a Discrimination violation and that the case will be closed. An LOF summarizes the allegations and the interviews regarding the alleged incident, and

- explains whether any disciplinary action, additional training of the staff member or other action will occur.
- (10) A copy of either the closure letter or LOF must be also be submitted to IDOT within **72** hours of that decision. Letters may be submitted by hardcopy or email.
- (11) A complainant dissatisfied with Illinois Center for Autism decision may file a complaint with the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) or the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) offices of Civil Rights: <u>IDOT</u>: ATTN ADA/Title VI Program Coordinator 2300 S Dirksen Parkway, Suite 317, Springfield, IL 62764 <u>FTA</u>: Attention Title VI Program Coordinator, East Building, 5th Floor-TCR 1200 New Jersey Ave., SE Washington DC 20590

Limited English Proficiency Plan

Illinois Center for Autism has developed the following Limited English Proficiency Plan (LEP) to help identify reasonable steps to provide language assistance for LEP persons seeking meaningful access to Illinois Center for Autism services as required by Executive Order 13166. A Limited English Proficiency person is one who does not speak English as their primary language and who has a limited ability to read, speak, write, or understand English.

This plan details procedures on how to identify a person who may need language assistance, the ways in which assistance may be provided, training to staff, notification to LEP persons that assistance is available, and information for future plan updates. In developing the plan while determining the Illinois Center for Autism's extent of obligation to provide LEP services, the Illinois Center for Autism undertook a U.S. Department of Transportation four-factor LEP analysis which considers the following:

1) The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible in the Illinois Center for Autism service area who may be served or likely to encounter by Illinois Center for Autism program, activities, or services;

Illinois Center for Autism staff reviewed the number of LEP persons within its service area of Madison and St. Clair Counties. No languages exceeded 5% of the population and only Spanish exceeded 1,000 persons.

2) The frequency with which LEP individuals come in contact with an Illinois Center for Autism services;

Illinois Center for Autism's staff reviewed the frequency with which office staff, dispatchers and drivers have, or could have, contact with LEP persons for 2024. Illinois Center for Autism averages 1 contact per month.

3) The nature and importance of the program, activities or services provided by the Illinois Center for Autism to the LEP population.

The Illinois Center for Autism provides transportation services related to its provision of life skills and vocational training to registered clients diagnosed with Autism and other developmental disabilities.

4) The resources available to Illinois Center for Autism and overall costs to provide LEP assistance. A brief description of these considerations is provided in the following section.

Illinois Center for Autism provides a statement in Spanish that will be included in all public outreach notices. Every effort will be made to provide vital information to LEP individuals in the language requested.

Safe Harbor Provision for written translations

Illinois Center for Autism complies with the Safe Harbor Provision, as evidenced by the number of documents available in the Spanish language. With respect to Title VI information, the following shall be made available in Spanish:

- (2) Discrimination Complaint Procedures

In addition, we will conduct our marketing (including using translated materials) in a manner that reaches each LEP group. Vital documents include the following:

- (4) Van Schedules
- (5) Route Changes
- (6) Public Hearings
- 1) Illinois Center for Autism provides language assistance services through the below methods:

- ☑ Instructions are provided to customer service staff and other Illinois Center for Autism staff who regularly take phone calls from the general public on how to respond to an LEP caller.
- ☑ Instructions are provided to customer service staff and others who regularly respond to written communication from the public on how to respond to written communication from an LEP person.
- □ LEP is addressed as part of communication needs with prospective clients, upon intake, and reviewed during annual service plan meetings. Strategies to meet LEP needs are developed with the client.
- 2) Illinois Center for Autism has a process to ensure the competency of interpreters and translation service through the following methods:

Illinois Center for Autism will ask the interpreter or translator to demonstrate that he or she can communicate or translate information accurately in both English and Spanish. Illinois Center for Autism will train the interpreter or translator in specialized terms and concepts associated with the agency's policies and activities. Illinois Center for Autism will instruct the interpreter or translator that he or she should not deviate into a role as counselor, legal advisor, or any other role aside from interpreting or translator. Illinois Center for Autism will ask the interpreter or translator to attest that he or she does not have a conflict of interest on the issues that they would be providing interpretation services.

- 3) Illinois Center for Autism provides notice to LEP persons about the availability of language assistance through the following methods:
 - □ Agency websites
 - □ Customer service lines
 - Availability of language assistance is reviewed with prospective clients, upon intake, and at annual service plan meetings. Strategies to meet LEP needs are developed with the client.
- 4) Illinois Center for Autism monitors, evaluates and updates the LEP plan through the following process:

Illinois Center for Autism will monitor the LEP plan by conducting an annual Four-Factor analysis, establishing a process to obtain feedback from internal staff and members of the public and conducting internal evaluations to determine whether the language assistance measures are working for staff. Illinois Center for Autism will make changes to the language assistance plan based on feedback received. Illinois Center for Autism may take into account the cost of proposed changes and the resources available to them. Depending on the evaluation, Illinois Center for Autism may choose to disseminate more widely those language assistance measures that are particularly effective or modify or eliminate those measures that have not been effective. Illinois Center for Autism will consider new language assistance needs when expanding transit service into areas with high concentrations of LEP persons will consider modifying their implementation plan to provide language assistance measures to areas not previously served by the agency.

5) All Illinois Center for Autism employees are trained to modify communication methods to meet the need of all individual served. Illinois Center for Autism trains employees to know their obligations to provide meaningful access to information and services for LEP persons and all employees in public contact positions will be properly trained to work effectively with in-person and telephone interpreters. Illinois Center for Autism will implement processes for training of staff through the following procedures:

Illinois Center for Autism will identify staff that are likely to come into contact with LEP persons as well as management staff that have frequent contact with LEP persons in order to target training to the appropriate staff. Illinois Center for Autism will identify existing staff training opportunities, as it may be cost-effective to integrate training on their responsibilities to persons with limited English proficiency into agency training that occurs on an ongoing basis. Illinois Center for Autism will include this training as part of the orientation for new employees. Existing employees, especially managers and those who work with the public may periodically take part in re-training or new training sessions to keep up to date on their responsibilities to LEP persons. Illinois Center for Autism will implement LEP training to be provided for agency staff. Illinois Center for Autism staff training for LEP to include:

- A summary of the Illinois Center for Autism responsibilities under the DOT LEP Guidance;
- A summary of the Illinois Center for Autism language assistance plan;
- A summary of the number and proportion of LEP persons in the Illinois Center for Autism service
 area, the frequency of contact between the LEP population and the agency's programs and
 activities, and the importance of the programs and activities to the population;
- A description of the type of language assistance that the agency is currently providing and instructions on how agency staff can access these products and services; and
- A description of the Illinois Center for Autism cultural sensitivity policies and practices.

Public Participation Plan

Illinois Center for Autism is engaging the public in its planning and decision-making processes, as well as its marketing and outreach activities. The public will be invited to participate in the process whether through public meetings or surveys.
